I. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor/Chairman Eaton called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and asked that everyone please silence their cell phones, pagers, and other electronic devices as a courtesy to others while the meeting is in session.

VIII. CONSENT CALENDAR

Council Member Dutrey requested that Item B-1 be removed from the Consent Calendar for comment.

B. Administrative Reports

1. Review of Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions (CC&Rs) to Establish Common Responsibilities and Easements for Individual Properties Located Within Castlerock Villas Neighborhood Property Owners Association

Council Member Dutrey expressed his understanding that the property whose owner declined membership in the proposed Castlerock Villas Owners Association will have very little impact on the formation of the owners association and maintenance of the subject properties.

City Manager Starr answered, "That is correct. That property is at the end of the project area, and the water to that property could simply be cut off, requiring the owner to bring in his own water service. The property is located at the end of the alleyway, so it does not affect the alley issue."

Council Member Dutrey complimented staff on its patience and tenacity over many years to organize the majority of Foundation Area 11 property owners for the betterment of the neighborhood.

Moved by Council Member Dutrey, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Raft, and carried unanimously that the City Council reviewed the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions (CC&Rs) to Establish Common Responsibilities and Easements for Individual Properties Located Within the Castlerock Villas Neighborhood Property Owners Association.

XI. **COMMUNICATIONS**

A. **City Attorney** – No comments

B. **City Manager/Executive Director**

1. City Manager/Executive Director Starr commented as follows:

- (a) In follow-up to **Ms. Urquizo's** inquiry at the last meeting, he reported that she had been previously advised by both Finance Division and Police Department staff of the process for found money including a requirement to advertise that cash had been found for the benefit of the person who lost it. He noted **Ms. Urquizo** had been informed that a check would be issued to her the day following the City Council's approval to do so at that meeting.
- (b) He reported that **Governor Brown** signed budget trailer bill **Assembly Bill 1484** last week, which took immediate effect and requires those involved in the redevelopment winding down process to learn and implement significant new rules of conduct just as they were beginning to adapt to and implement the already complex rules mandated by last year's **ABX1 26**. He noted staff is continuing the process of evaluating the potential impacts of the legislation, though "it does appear the City Council has made a number of correct decisions that allow some potential fiscal recovery for the City as we go forward" including authorizing the Mission Boulevard Tax Allocation Notes of 2008 to be defeased to avoid default, assigning certain Redevelopment Agency properties to the City, and appropriating unspent bond proceeds to the City that potentially could be applied to Public Works projects. He cautioned that the penalty for not abiding by the new rules is that the City's share of sales and property tax revenues would be withheld. He noted it is staff's opinion that **AB 1484** may have a positive outcome for the City.

Council Member Dutrey asked for clarification on the July 12, 2012 deadline pursuant to the Dissolution Act for a successor agency to pay the county controller any excess reserve demands.

Finance Director Parker advised that the **San Bernardino County Auditor-Controller's Office** informed him today that at this point, the City would not be liable to submit a payment of its proportional share by July 12. He noted the County has been sympathetic regarding the "ridiculous and onerous" requirement.

Council Member Dutrey expressed his understanding of the City's position.

C. **Mayor/Chairman**

1. **Announcement of Appointments to the Community Action Committee**

Mayor Eaton announced interviews of nine candidates were recently held by an interview panel consisting of Mayor Pro Tem Raft, Council Member Ruh, and Community Action Committee Chairperson Pat Wooton. He stated that with Council concurrence, he would be pleased to reappoint CAC

Member Mary Fondario and appoint new Members **Denise Carrington** and **Arturo Padilla**.

It was the consensus of the City Council to reappoint CAC Member Mary Fondario and appoint new Members Denise Carrington and Arturo Padilla to the CAC for four-year terms ending June 30, 2016.

Mayor Eaton thanked all applicants for their interest in serving their community. He congratulated and welcomed CAC Member Padilla to the CAC and congratulated CAC Member Fondario on her reappointment.

2. Mayor Eaton commented concerning recent news articles regarding the City Council's opinion on public safety in Montclair. He cited one reference that indicated the City Council does not care about public safety and considers it "evil." He asserted that the reference is absurd and has absolutely no basis in fact, noting 65 percent of the City's budget is allocated to public safety and that including public works funding brings the total percentage to between 80 and 85 percent. He asked City Manager Starr to address remarks made about Fire Department staffing.

City Manager Starr advised that a reference in one of the articles that the City is down seven positions is certainly controvertible. He reviewed a 2009 reorganization report that recommended three Firefighter positions be replaced with a Deputy Fire Chief and a third Division Chief, resulting in the elimination of only one Firefighter position. He emphasized that the reorganization had nothing to do with the Great Recession and was based on recommendations from the Fire Department and the former City Manager and approved by the City Council. He stated that a Secretary resigned from the Fire Department and was not replaced through attrition. In addition, he advised that an Administrative Services Officer position was merged with a Deputy Fire Marshal position as a result of the unfortunate passing of Deputy Fire Marshal Tim Bissett; the Administrative Services Officer assumed the Deputy Fire Marshal duties and was reclassified as such. He noted a Senior Fire Inspector recently retired, and that it is unlikely the position will be filled, with those duties being assumed by the Deputy Fire Marshal and another Senior Fire Inspector.

City Manager Starr clarified the impact on services to the community of the three Firefighter positions, noting the other four are administrative positions. He noted the three Division Chiefs were moved to shift work, leaving an impact of two Firefighters as a reduction in personnel who provide fire-related services to the community.

City Manager Starr noted he has not spoken to representatives of the Montclair Fire Fighters Association related to their perception on the seven positions. He advised that the recruitment for two Captain positions has been completed from current personnel and that a Firefighter recruitment would be conducted sometime in the near future.

Mayor Eaton thanked City Manager Starr for the report.

D. City Council/Successor Agency Board/MHC Board

1. Council Member/Director Paulitz commented as follows:
 - (a) He noted today was the first day of the new senior lunch program with a suggested donation of \$2 plus \$.25 for

coffee. He advised that each meal costs the City \$3.90, which is offset by the \$2 donation and a small subsidy funded by a grant through the **United States Department of Agriculture**.

(b) He stated, "Through the years, we have heard this business that public safety has to be the No. 1 priority in the City. I have told my many colleagues and anyone who wants to listen that we were elected by the people of Montclair to represent them—not unions or employees. And you really cannot take one part of the City and say, 'This is more important than the other.' I have always said, 'Yes, Police Officers protect us as do Firefighters if we have a fire or injury. However, we also have parks to maintain, streets to maintain, and recreation programs. The community gets together through Human Services Division programs, not through the Police Department or Fire Department. They get together at the Christmas Tree-Lighting ceremony, the Halloween party, the Family Fun Festival, and so forth. The seniors have a very well-run program. All of that is equally important in this City. I am not going to have anybody tell me, 'Well, you do not like the Police Officers or Firefighters because you do not put them up on a pedestal.' No, I don't. I put all the City employees on an equal basis because I am representing all the people of Montclair. Thank you."

2. Mayor Pro Tem/Vice Chairperson Raft stated she was quite upset over the spate of news articles related to public safety in Montclair. She strongly stated that each and every Council Member cares very much about public safety and that devoting 85 percent of the annual City Budget to it speaks for itself. In response to a reference made in one article that the public is in jeopardy because of the lack of paramedics, she asked City Manager Starr to report on the number of paramedics who respond to calls for service.

City Manager Starr stated, "There should be one paramedic on each engine company. Typically, there is one paramedic on the rescue squad operating out of Engine Company 151. Under normal complement, there should be four employees—one of which a paramedic—on Engine Company 152. Even if the paramedic squad is parked, there should be one paramedic at all times on each of the engine companies. In addition, when calls for service come in, **American Medical Response (AMR)** responds to each medical-related call with a paramedic on board the ambulance, providing a minimum of two paramedics responding to every medical-related call. If the rescue squad responds, there would typically be (in a response from Station 1) three paramedics: one on the rescue squad, one on the engine company, and one from **AMR**. If it is a light day and Station 2 is responding to the same call, you could potentially have four paramedics; however, if it is a crew that has a Division Chief or Fire Captain who are also paramedic-qualified, then you could have as many as five paramedics responding to a call. The Fire Chief himself maintains his paramedic certification status. If he chooses to respond to a call, and he often does, then you could add him to the complement as well. While at minimum it may be that two paramedics respond (one City and one **AMR**). That is the minimum, but you could have as many as six at one time as well.

Mayor Pro Tem Raft stated, "That tells me all the residents of the City are pretty well covered. I think it is pretty bad when some of our bargaining units try to make the City Council look

bad just because they are upset and do not get their way every time. I think they really should start thinking twice about what they are saying. Thank you."

Mayor Eaton thanked Mayor Pro Tem Raft for her comments.

3. Council Member/Director Dutrey commented as follows:
 - (a) He noted he will most likely be out of town to pick up a visiting family member at **Los Angeles International Airport** and unable to attend the July 16, 2012 regular joint meeting.
 - (b) He thanked City Manager Starr for providing him with a report on emergency medical services (EMS) deployment for the last fiscal year, noting the unit was only in service 15 percent of the time. He stated, "For me, this is unacceptable. I think the policy of this City Council is to have two fire engines and the one EMS unit to be fully deployed. This is what we approved in the last fiscal year budget. This has been the practice of this City since I was first elected to serve on the City Council in 1996. I think actually that prior to 1996, there were two fire engines and two EMS units at each station. If deployment needs to be changed or if jump staffing is required, then this City Council needs to decide that and approve any changes. It should not be decided by staff members but should be decided by the City Council. My position is that the deployment of two fire engines and the EMS unit is adequate and should continue. There have been times in the past two years that we have gone to jump staffing, which the City Council has approved. Obviously, I understand we are in a Great Recession; and all departments, including the Fire Department, have taken their cuts. However, the EMS unit was still in service during the great majority of the time for each of these years. I'm puzzled how we can spend \$520,000 in overtime in the Fire Department for Fiscal Year 2011-12; however, the EMS unit was in service only 15 percent of the time. In Fiscal Year 2008-09, which was really our first year when we experienced a great deal of revenue reduction, the Department at the time had an overtime budget of \$650,000; and because of the Great Recession, we did go to jump staffing. However, that EMS unit was in service at least 60 or 70 percent of the time. So I would hope that, again, this would not occur.

"The City Manager has prepared a memorandum dated June 25, 2012, to further detail the full deployment of the EMS unit and the overtime. I ask for the following: I ask that a report be prepared to the City Council by September 21, 2012, on the status of the number of days the EMS unit is deployed and the usage of the overtime budget from July 1 to September 15, 2012. Obviously, I am one person on the City Council. If the City Council wishes not to proceed with this, then I as a City Council Member would ask the City Manager to provide the report only to me.

"In continuation with the memo, I would ask that any proposed changes in the Fire Department not be implemented until this City Council has had an opportunity in Open Session to consider and take action on it. Any proposed changes should include a comprehensive analysis on the pros and cons as prepared or as implemented by the City Manager, the Executive Director of

Public Safety, and the Fire Chief. I think this City Council should have full knowledge and understanding of any of the consequences—if they are good or bad—of any recommendations. I also ask that the surrounding fire agencies be contacted to ensure that we do not have issues regarding mutual aid obligations due to any previous or proposed future changes to the Fire Department.

"The residents of this City, I believe, deserve a great public safety. This is what my goal is, and I do believe this should be the goal of this entire City Council. I hope we can work together to ensure that the Montclair Fire Department does provide a level of service our residents expect. I do want to comment on remarks made by Council Member Paulitz: All of our departments and all of our services are equally important, and it is not my position to pick one service or one department over another. It is my position to ensure we do have three apparatus units out there. Obviously, staffing could be a different level on how we go about achieving it: bringing it back to three positions later on or however we do it. Thank you."

Mayor Eaton asked Council Member Dutrey if he wants his report by the end of September 2012.

Council Member Dutrey noted he requested the report be provided by September 21, 2012, covering the period from July 1 through September 15, 2012, "which is basically two-and-one-half months."

Mayor Eaton asked if there is any opposition to the report.

Council Member Paulitz stated, "My contention is that we hired a City Manager to run the City. we should not be trying to micromanage the City Manager. If we do not like what the City Manager does, then we fire him. He runs the agencies beyond that. I went back to look at the Fire Department budget, and I did not see anywhere a statement—and if I am wrong, correct me—that says, 'This unit will always be in service.' And No. 2, overtime, which this year is \$400,000, is it adequate to cover all of the callbacks that will be necessary to do that? I do not think that is possible. I did not see it in there. I did not see any statement of fact that the rescue unit will always be out there whether it is needed or not in many cases. We have not had any house burn down because we did not respond correctly. We have had no deaths or injuries as far as I know. I have had people approach me telling me they are tired of hearing about this subject in the newspaper. They want this shut down. Now, we have a memo from our City Manager indicating in the new fiscal year, there is a \$400,000 overtime budget allocated for that. In the meantime, I am sure we could put that rescue squad in use all the time. But by the Midyear Budget Review, we would find out all the overtime money is gone; and then what would we do? I think we should let the City Manager manage and let it go at that. Thank you."

Council Member Ruh stated, "As far as getting a report itself, I think any one of us could ask the Chief for a report and get it from him. I think it is very simple. I would not have a problem asking him. I do not think we

have to go through the City Manager, who can ask the Chief, who gives it back to the City Manager, who gives it to the Council. It is a bit arcane. I can get it if I want to get it. Any one of us here could ask the Chief. Council Member Paulitz brought up a point that I had not thought of about micromanaging the City Manager. I know with the previous City Manager, that was a hue and cry from this Council: Do not manage Lee. Leave him alone; let him make decisions. If we start micromanaging one department, will that lead to micromanaging everything? Will we now go the Senior Center and say, 'This is how something is to be done. This is how it will be staffed and scheduled.' Will we then go to Public Works and say, 'This is how you will dig the ditch. This is how many workers will be scheduled.' I think we need to let a City Manager and the department heads manage their respective departments. Fire Chief Ament can work with the City Manager and figure out what needs to be done. If we want to start micromanaging, then that is fine; but let us do so with every single department in this City. I do not know if that is the will of this Council. If we want to, we can do that; and that is fine. But we cannot pick and choose and say it is good for one department to have the Council decide things, but not for the others. So let us do the same with the others. That is just my opinion on the subject."

Mayor Pro Tem Raft stated, "I agree. That is what City Manager Starr was hired to do. Otherwise, he would be taking orders from us on a daily basis. He would not get anything else done."

Mayor Eaton advised that a directive was given to the Fire Department a few days ago to put the paramedic squad back in service. He suggested the procedure be given time to work.

Council Member Ruh asked if it is correct procedure for Council Members to make requests directly to department heads.

City Manager Starr stated that technically, the City Council should work through the City Manager and not directly with department heads. He noted at times the process is not followed because the request may not be very complicated, so it really depends on the nature of the request.

Council Member Dutrey noted he realizes he is just one vote. He stated, "My purpose here is not to make this a controversial issue or to make anyone look bad. My purpose is really to address the issue of the EMS unit being in service only 15 percent of the time last fiscal year. If the City Council wishes not to receive the report, that is its prerogative. I ask as one member of the City Council if the City Manager could provide that report. I hope that if there is any additional change in the Fire Department that it does come to this Council. I hope that we do have some type of comprehensive analysis from the City Manager, Executive Director of Public Safety, and Fire Chief if there are any changes. I further hope surrounding fire agencies will be contacted to make sure there are no mutual-aid issues. Thank you."

Council Member Ruh stated, "In light of people talking about public safety, let us look at this City in its totality."

We did build a brand-new state of the art Police headquarters that is the envy of many surrounding cities. We have pushed for and obtained a paramedic program. It is a very good program, one that I am very proud of. All the employees in that program do an excellent job. Because it is a subscription program, I have gone door-to-door talking to residents about their need to register to be a part of the subscription program so they will have that service if necessary. This Council recently voted for a Community Facilities District in the North Montclair Downtown Specific Plan. That CFD is specifically for public safety. In good economic times we have provided raises and benefits to those in public safety. In good economic times, we have provided good equipment and technology; and I will say we continue to do so to this day. City Manager Starr indicated earlier that in every call for service, there has been a paramedic on that fire truck. We have one of the highest Police Officer to resident ratio than any city in this region, certainly higher than all of the cities that directly border Montclair. That is something I am proud of. If we want to look at public safety in a traditional sense, we can do so. But that is a very small and very static view. The global view is that as a City, almost everything we do involves public safety. I want you to consider for a moment: A car hits a pothole in the road and breaks an axle. That is public safety. The driver is not going to accept the rationale that the City had to fund something else and had no funds to fill a pothole, causing the broken axle. A person walks along one of our sidewalks, trips and falls, and breaks a leg. That is public safety. The person will not accept the rationale that the sidewalk was not fixed because the City needed money for another program. That is public safety. In any new building in Montclair, the owner finds that a beam has collapsed. He would not accept that the City did not have sufficient building inspectors to ensure the safe construction of the building. Should a tree branch fall on a vehicle, the owner will not accept that the City did not have funds to trim trees. A resident sitting on a chair that collapses during a concert in the Starlight Patio Theater is not going to accept the excuse that the chair was old and the City could not replace it because money was needed for another project or program in the City. What is the cost to the City in liability for these accidents? My point is that everything done for this community is public safety. I believe we have always put a priority on public safety; we have always funded public safety to ensure all referenced scenarios do not happen."

Council Member Ruh noted the City is in difficult financial times, though Montclair is in much better shape than many other communities. He noted the recently approved Fiscal Year 2012-13 City Budget is available at City Hall and online for public review, expressing his hope that anyone concerned about public safety funding could perhaps find it in the budget. He stated the City Council needs employee input as well on budget issues. He stated that he and other members of the City Council welcome any ideas on how to balance the City budget while meeting the wants and needs of all departments.

Council Member Ruh appealed to all residents to please shop in Montclair to keep sales tax revenue here and to subscribe to the paramedic program because of the importance of having the service if needed.

Council Member Ruh stated that the first priority of any local government is fiscal stability to ensure that we have a balanced budget and healthy reserves. He noted the cities of Hercules and Stockton are examples of poor fiscal management. He stated that he applauds the efforts of every full-time, part time, and contract employee of the City because "they are all involved in something that is vitally important to residents. Otherwise, we would not be offering those programs."

4. Council Member/Director Ruh commented as follows:
 - (a) He cautioned everyone about a cell phone scam related to winning a major department store gift card. He suggested individuals give the incoming telephone number to the **Public Utilities Commission** or local Police Department.
 - (b) He noted the Council's and his disappointment in the **Metropolitan Transportation Authority's** recent decision not to fund the **Gold Line** extension to Azusa and through to Montclair, preferring instead to fund the first phase of the Subway to the Sea project.
 - (c) He announced **Assembly Member Torres's** 2nd Annual District Open House on Saturday, July 28, 2012, and encouraged attendance to receive information on resident programs.
 - (d) He thanked and expressed his appreciation of all CAC applicants. He congratulated new CAC Members Denise Carrington and Arturo Padilla.
 - (e) He thanked outgoing CAC Member Hollis Judkins for her many years of service on the CAC. He wished **Ms. Judkins** "all the best."
 - (f) He encouraged participation in nearby Fourth of July celebrations but appealed to residents to refrain from using fireworks in the City. He stated, "Remember that it took a lot of sacrifice to build this country; and we are going to continue, even at a local level, to ask for sacrifice to continue moving forward."
